Top tips

Prepare, Review, Complete

Prepare	①	Make sure you meet all the eligibility criteria to apply for College Fellowship before commencing your application.
	②	Discuss your readiness to apply with a trusted mentor, colleague or College Fellow.
	③	If you meet the criteria but don't feel confident to apply, consider if self-doubt is holding you back. Seek some outside perspective for clarity.
☆	👤	<i>Did you know women are far less likely to apply for Fellowship even when they're amply qualified to do so?</i>
Review	④	Choose referees who can address your accomplishments and speak to the extent and significance of your contributions.
	⑤	Include documents that strengthen your application (awards, citations etc.) and give weight to your claims against the selection criteria.
	⑥	Ensure your CV is current, enhances your overall application, substantiates your contributions, and emphasises your accomplishments.
☆	📅	<i>Applications for Fellowship typically open in June. Keep an eye out for email updates from the College so you don't miss the deadline.</i>
Complete	⑦	Don't become overwhelmed. Set aside time to thoughtfully work through each question. If it helps, break up the task over shorter sittings.
	⑧	Detail projects, roles, publications etc. that demonstrate a significant contribution/commitment on behalf of the College and/or profession.
	⑨	Don't assume the panel will infer detail you haven't provided. Anything you want them to know and consider, you need to tell them!
