Unlocking the code- professional code of conduct

Paramedicine is a newly regulated profession in Australia and with the introduction of regulation in 2018 came increased professional responsibilities – including the introduction of a professional code of conduct. We interviewed paramedics about their use and understanding of the paramedicine professional code of conduct. Through thematic analysis, this study explores the role that paramedics believe the code has in ethical and professional decision-making, the new responsibilities the code introduced as part of being a registered professional and how paramedics used the code to navigate these new responsibilities.

Informed and implied consent

Informed consent is integral to the right to information in the Australian charter of healthcare rights, and recognised in professional codes of conduct. Ensuring informed consent is properly obtained is a legal, ethical and professional requirement on the part of ALL treating health professionals and supports person-centred care. This session aims to discuss the importance of informed consent and how to achieve this in the out of hospital environment. It will also discuss the complexities of implied consent, capacity and situations where consent is not available.
