The Best Care... Anywhere. Breaking down the barriers of medical care in the bush

There are many barriers to providing excellent, patient centred care in remote and austere settings and it is important we do what is possible to overcome these and remain focused on providing the best care.. anywhere. Haemorrhage Control and Trauma Care in Rural and Remote Australia: Applying the Lessons from War

In rural and remote Australia, haemorrhage and trauma represent the greatest disease burden, and residents are 50% more likely to die from injury than their urban counterparts. Rural and remote environments offer unique challenges to primary responders. With support from the US Military, we are developing a novel small-volume fluid therapy comprising adenosine, lidocaine and magnesium (ALM) for haemorrhagic shock and traumatic injury which has demonstrated resuscitation and stabilization properties in multiple pre-clinical models. The new ALM therapy may provide a novel solution to the unique challenges of treating major trauma and haemorrhage in rural and remote Australia.

Acute Rheumatic Fever and Rheumatic Heart Disease ... Forgotten but not gone!

Rheumatic Heart Disease (RHD) is 100% preventable, yet rates in Indigenous Australians are the highest in the world. This presentation will look at what the common signs and symptoms of Acute Rheumatic Fever (ARF) and RHD. The presentation will also consider how ARF and RHD can be prevented at the primordial, primary, secondary and tertiary levels of prevention. Current prevalence and incidence rates of ARF and RHD will also be shared.
